Sister School 1: Academy of Fine Arts in Warsaw, Poland

Prot Jarnuszkiewicz is Vice-Rector at the Academy of Fine Arts in Warsaw. His Background is in the



field of film, television and photography. In the 2016-2020 term, dean of the Faculty of Media Art at the Academy of Fine Arts in Warsaw. He runs the Visual Relations Studio at this Faculty, whose graduates have won the first prize four times at the Coming Out Exhibition Best Diplomas of the Academy of Fine Arts in Warsaw, once — in the nationwide show Best Diplomas of the Academy of Fine Arts. Head of research tasks. For his contribution to the didactic and scientific development of the Academy, he was awarded four times with the Rector of the Academy of Fine Arts in Warsaw, including the most prestigious one — Pegasus.

Barbara Albert has been working as a director and screenwriter since 1997. Her cinematic work



includes NORDRAND, FREE RADICALS, FALLING, THE DEAD AND THE LIVING and MADEMOISELLE PARADIS). In 1999 she founded the film production company coop99 in Vienna, Austria, with which she worked as a co-producer for projects by Jasmila Zbanic (GRBAVICA, NA PUTU, QUO VADIS, AIDA?), Shirin Neshat, Hans Weingartner and Hubert Sauper. In recent years, her focus has been on working

as a director for cinema & streaming services. Since 2013 she has been teaching feature films at the Film University Babelsberg KONRAD WOLF. When working with students, she brings her experience of collaboration between producer, screenwriter and director to the table. She supports students in finding the right form for their stories and pays special attention to the communication between actors and directors.

Susanne Binninger studied philosophy and art sciences as well as visual communication (specializing



in photography and film), first at the GHK Kassel (1988-91), then at the Berlin University of the Arts and the FU Berlin (1991/92). After graduating, she began studying directing at the Hochschule für Film und Fernsehen 'Konrad Wolf' in Potsdam-Babelsberg in 1992, graduating in 2000. While still a student, Binninger made her first feature-length documentary film, "Die Kandidaten" (1997), about a series of contestants on the popular television show "Wetten, dass...?". "Die Kandidaten" premiered as the opening film of the 1997 Duisburg Film Week and received very positive reviews. Her graduation film "Kalte Krieger" (2000), about young people in Berlin's left-wing scene in the decade before the fall of the Berlin Wall, was nominated for the First Steps Award. Today Susanne

Binninger is a well established documentary film director and she produces her films out of her own company Oktoberfilms. In addition to her work as a producer, writer and director, Susanne Binninger has been and continues to be active as a lecturer at the Film University Babelsberg, the German Film and Television Academy Berlin and the Freie Schule Filmarche Berlin, among others.

Sister School 4: HKU Art University of Utrecht, The Netherlands

*Henny Dörr and Ronen Abas will offer a joint mentorship. Please explain how you would benefit from this joint mentorship.

*Henny Dörr, MA, is theatre scientist and works as a researcher and lecturer at HKU, University of



the Arts Utrecht. She graduated in Theatre Studies at the University of Amsterdam in 1986. She specialized in Spanish drama until the 18th century, and Russian drama of the 19th and 20th century. After her graduation she combined a practice as dramaturg/advisor with teaching in different institutes in Higher Arts Education, offering courses on theatre history, history of scenography, history of acting and of opera, as well as on theatre theory and dramaturgy. Meanwhile she specialized in site specific (location) theatre within and without festivals and advised different groups and commissions. Her special interests were and are still design for theater and performance, scenography, site specific and devised theatre, (post)modern and contemporary dramaturgy. Her focus

has also always been on creative and performative processes and practices that transgress the boundaries of disciplines.

With that profile she developed a range of bachelor and master courses on theatre design, (interactive) performance design and scenography, and made a foundation for interdisciplinary work as well as artistic research that led to structural collaborations between the theatre programs. As such she made a large contribution to the interdisciplinary curriculum of the Theatre Department at HKU. Until 2021 she has been heading the international MA Scenography program, which strongly focuses on expanding forms of scenography and contemporary ideas on spectatorship. As course director and tutor Henny Dörr challenged conventional views of knowledge transfer and created an inclusive learning and research environment. Currently they offer courses on scenography and on artistic research methods. She has a vast international network within the expanded fields of scenography, worked with schools and professionals and conducted workshops and gave lectures over the years in Prague, Giessen, Helsinki, London, Athens, Seville, Barcelona, Hong Kong, Macau, Jakarta, Ahmedabad, Mumbai.

HKU theater for twenty years. I have a background in theater making and documentary filmmaking. In recent years I have been involved as a project manager in the international theater collaborative program Boundary Crossing, which reflects my interest in teaching students to view and develop their work from different (shifting) perspectives and to see the creative process as a form of dialogue and art as a change agent. In addition to my work for HKU theater, I am also an HKU project manager regarding inclusion and equality in the HKU educational system. Inclusion and equality are topics close to my heart and are my starting point in coaching.

Anne-Maartje Lemereis, composer and pianist. Anne-Maartje wrote her first composition when she



was four years old and never stopped after that. She studied piano and composition and is currently working as a composer, pianist, teacher and organizer. Anne-Maartje teaches composition and music theory and is a mentor/study coach/research supervisor at the HKU Utrechts Conservatorium. She has also played an important role in House of Europe - International Songwriting Project. Anne-Maartje composed on behalf of various musicians and ensembles, such as the mini-opera 'Ping' for Ensemble Vonk, 'Lumen' for Mallet Collective, 'Aleksandra', 'MiniMahler' & 'La Folia / La Mento' and 'Viglid' for Podium Witteman and the music

theatrical song cycle 'This is not a Fairy Tale' in co-production with KASKO and Stichting In de Knop. Her music sounded in the Concertgebouw Amsterdam, Tivoli Vredenburg, at Wonderfeel festival, November Music and on Lowlands, among others. Anne-Maartje has been a composer at KASKO since June 2019. Anne-Maartje specialized in playing contemporary repertoire. She regularly performs on stage with her own work and enjoys working and working a lot with other musicians. Anne-Maartje is a teacher in composition and music theory and as a mentor/study coach/research supervisor at the Utrecht Conservatory. In addition, together with composer Remy Alexander, she provides composition education to children from the age of 4 via Stichting In de Knop.

In 2015, Anne-Maartje started a neighborhood orchestra in the Amersfoort district of Liendert; the neighborhood where she grew up. Everyone is welcome with this orchestra; regardless of age, level or instrument. Anne-Maartje takes care of the tailor-made packages so that everyone can play at his or her own level. The Lienderts Orchestra has grown over the years into a solid cultural association in Liendert.

Sister School 5: Royal College of Music in Stockholm, Sweden

My name is Susanne Rosenberg, and I'm a folk singer, pedagogue, researcher and professor in folk



singing at the Department of Folk Music, Academy 1 at the Royal College of Music in Stockholm (KMH), Sweden. And I'm looking forward to participating in this mentoring project within ELIA. At the KMH, I teach traditional solo singing, polyphonic singing, performance practice, artistic process, kulning (herding call), artistic research, orality as a method, improvisation etc. I also tutor and mentor students in their artistic projects on the bachelor, master, and doctoral levels.

Since my doctoral studies were in artistic research, my main focus lies within that field. The themes in my artistic research have been singing

style, scenic contexts for folk singing, artistic methods, improvisation and variation in folk singing. I also work with scientific research, mainly voice acoustics and voice function. In my career as a singer, I have worked with different kinds of music, folk music, new art music, jazz, early music etc., and have also worked within the theatre. I like to listen to and try to understand different folk singing traditions, and the best way to do so is through listening, singing, and analysing. Besides music, my interest lies in writing, farming and handicraft (weaving, textile, knitting, pottery, woodwork). I live with my husband in a house on an island in the archipelago outside Stockholm. The best way to use my mentoring besides being taking part in the student's artistic process and development, would be within folk singing, artistic process/research and methods, and understanding the voice and different singing styles.
